Holocaust and Resistance

Nazi Germany took over Europe and implemented a brutal, suppressed racial rule. Its peak was the "Final Solution of the Jewish Question", with the attempt to liquidate the entire Jewish people, resulting in the murder of six million. This course deals with those who managed to stand up to this murderous policy and resist. This course will focus on the different forms of resistance and resilience during the Holocaust, on the dilemmas and the tough choices people faced, from a broader universal perspective. Among the subjects that the course will teach are the establishment of underground organizations in the ghettos, the life of the Jewish partisans, fighting in the armies, acts of revenge, uprisings, rebellions in the camps, and more.

Behavioral disorders and learning disabilities

Education Department (WGC)

The course will deepen current theoretical knowledge regarding learning disabilities behavioral and emotional disorders in children and adolescents that may impair their academic, social functioning and mental well-being. In particular, emphasis will be placed on attention deficit disorder, rebellious disorder, aggression, social rejection and anxiety disorders, their current definition, diagnosis and characteristics. In the course we will examine the risk factors for the appearance of the disorder: biological, environmental and developmental, as well as the "protective" factors. In addition, emphasis will be placed on interventions with the child and his environment aimed at dealing with the problems.

Evidence-Based Cybersecurity

The criminology Department (WGC) and Georgia State University, USA

An evidence-based cybersecurity approach provides an ideal framework for conceptualizing an interdisciplinary problem like cybersecurity because it stresses moving beyond decision makers' political, financial, social backgrounds and personal experiences to a model in which policy decisions are made based on scientific research findings. This approach draws on the assumption that solutions to human behaviors may be affected by the interconnected behavior of victims, offenders and law enforcement agencies operating within the cyber realm, and that the effectiveness of the different interventions should be assessed through rigorous scientific research methods. The purpose of this course is to introduce students with the key pillars of the evidence-based cybersecurity approach and highlights their relevance in the context of existing technical, social and legal trends in this field.

Contemporary Issues in Corrections

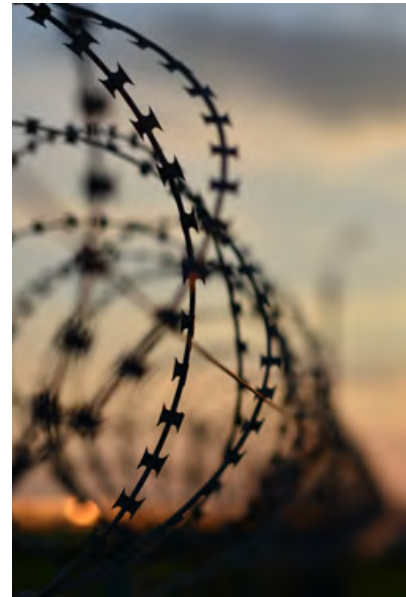
The Criminology Department (WGC) and Appalachian State University, USA

The Criminology Department (WGC)

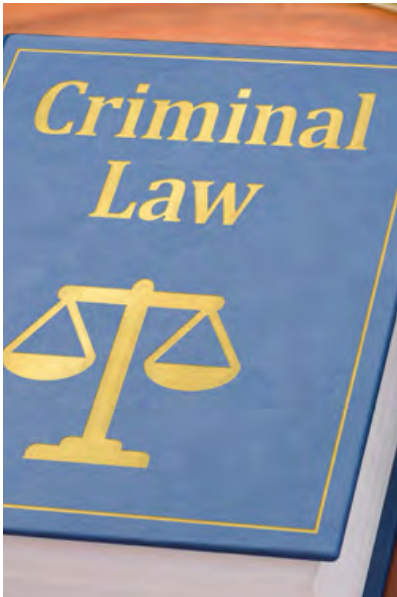
